Stormy weather... hurricanes, floods, human tragedy—current news headlines that we're all too familiar with.

Many children here in Utah live every day with tragedy, storms, and disasters. They witness and bear the destructive aftermath of trauma. Storms swirl and beat against them; many times, there are no relief workers to show up to rescue and rebuild.

Foster parents are like disaster relief workers who choose to come to the aid of innocent children living and struggling in the storms of unhealthy decisions. From infants to teenagers, children are removed from their homes for safety and brought into a child welfare system they did not choose to be a part of. In FY16, there were 21,093 child welfare investigations in Utah, with 9,993 child victims of neglect, sexual abuse, physical and psychological abuse, and domestic violence* Each one represents a disaster, tragedy, or storm where children get lost in society's debris.

Thank you to all foster parents who shelter children from the devastating storms of abuse and neglect—and thank you to our generous donors, who invest in our mission. We, here at Utah Foster Care, are grateful for your willingness to help heal broken hearts and become a trusted anchor in the lives of Utah's children.
